





There are various issues which the Black and Latino communities refuse to seriously address. Yes, some handkerchief head politician or publicity seeking opportunistic preacher will make some noise about gun violence in particular Black on Black, Brown on Brown gun violence. However, too often it will be said "Blacks and Latinos do not manufacturer the guns nor are major distributors of them." Nevertheless, more often then not, it is a Black or Brown person who will be on the end of a bullet shot from a gun in the hand of another Black or Brown person. Educational Opportunities For Individuals With Criminal Records

Legislation has recently been introduced in Congress which would create more educational opportunities for potential students with criminal records. The bill introduced by Congressman Cedric Richmond (D-LA) and Congressman Elijah Cummings (D-MD) entitled Beyond the Box for Higher Education Act would encourage colleges and universities to remove criminal and juvenile justice questions from their admissions applications. The sponsors of the bill believe such a move would significantly increase more individuals, in particular Blacks and other people of color, the chance to obtain a higher education beyond high school.

"Education is the gateway for success in accomplishing anything in life, and all American citizens regardless of a criminal background deserve the right to an education." stated Congressman Richmond.

Approximately, 70 millions Americans have some type of criminal which show up on all type of routine background checks making it more difficult for those individuals to go to college, finding a good paying job and rebuilding their lives. Studies have show that college applicants rejection rates are 12 to 13 percentage

points higher for those without. Many with criminal records will fail to complete their application once they reach the criminal history question, knowing that responding to the question honestly would reduce their chance of admissions. The Ricmond and Cummings bill would offer recommendations for colleges and universities that decide to keep criminal and juvenile justice questions, such as delaying the request to avoid a chilling effect, and making transparent, specific, and narrow inquiries that offer prospective students the opportunity to explain their circumstances.

"This bill is a necessary step forward to removing collateral consequences and systemic barriers to entry for people who deserve another chance at life," stated Congressman Richmond.

"Education changes lives, often keeping individuals off the path that

TRENTON-El pasado jueves 30 de mayo, cientos de madres de familia participaron en la manifestación "rally" que organizó Advocates for Children of New Jersey para bebés denominado "Strolling Thunder New Jersey 2019" evento que se realizó frente a la gobernación de Nueva Jersey en Trenton.

"Yo vengo de Newark y estoy aquí para apoyar a mis niños. Ouiero que familias de Nueva Jersey. La compensación adicional debida al aumento del salario mínimo será un gran aumento para los trabajadores de cuidado infantil, pero la realidad es que los proveedores no podrán pagarles sin más apoyo estatal. Los salarios más altos para los trabajadores de cuidado infantil deben venir con una mayor inversión estatal", dijo Cecilia Zalkind, presidenta y CEO de Advocates for Children of New Jersey



ellos cuenten con mejores recursos para su futuro" dijo Kimberly una madre de familia de Newark que vino con su niño Brian de un año de edad. ACNJ entregó una petición con más de 1,100 firmas, pidiendo al Gobernador Phil Murphy y al liderazgo legislativo a tomar medidas inmediatas para aumentar las inversiones y los subsidios estatales para el cuidado de niños en los centros infantiles, que atienden a familias de bajos recursos económicos.

"Los trabajadores de cuidado infantil tienen una enorme responsabilidad al cuidar y educar a los niños de las (ACNJ).

Lurdes Lemus, otra madre de familia que es de Trenton, vino con su niño de 2 años de edad y dijo que también venía a apoyar y a pedir a los legisladores que entreguen más recursos para los niños. Dijo además que es el segundo año que viene a esta manifestación y que esta agradecida por la tarjeta de \$50.00 que le entregaron.

ACNJ solicitó \$ 19 millones en fondos adicionales para el subsidio de cuidado de niños que se incluirán en el presupuesto estatal del año fiscal 2020 antes de la fecha límite del 30 de junio.







Conmemoración de la tragedia del Volcán del fuego en Guatemala

Hace un año, el tres de junio de 2018 para ser exactos, la comunidad San Miguel Los Lotes, en Guatemala, sufrió las consecuencias de la erupción del Volcán del fuego. Se tiene registro del aumento de la actividad volcánica desde el día dos de junio cuando los centros de estudio notaron donde abundan los volcanes, nada más en Guatemala hay 32 volcanes de los cuales presentan actividad tres, el volcán Pacaya, Fuego y Santiaguito (EFEverde, 2019). Lo anterior permite deducir que es casi inevitable que las ciudades y asentamientos en Guatemala no estén cerca de algún volcán ya sea inactivo o activo, por consiguiente se esperaría



cambios que indicaban una posible erupción. Sin embargo, cuando las autoridades alertaron a las familias y ordenaron la evacuación, fue demasiado tarde (Barrientos, 2019). A Pesar de comenzar el éxodo de esta comunidad guatemalteca, las cenizas y el material volcánico avanzaba con mayor rapidez llevandose todo a su paso, autos, casas, árboles y la vida de centenares de personas. Hasta el día de hoy se contabilizan 202 muertos y 229 siguen desaparecidos (El comercio, 2019)

Un ño después de lo ocurrido la comunidad no logra recuperarse de los daños ocurridos, recuerdan con tristeza a los seres queridos que perdieron la vida durante la tragedia. San Miguel los Lotes es actualmente un lugar con montañas de material volcánico, aún se evidencian restos de algunas construcciones que quedaron convertidas en ruinas después de la erupción. Actualmente, continúan desaparecidas muchas víctimas, de las cuales nunca se encontraron sus cuerpos, ya que las autoridades interrumpieron la búsqueda, pues según estos seguir moviendo la arena volcánica implicaba dificultades y riesgos (El comercio, 2019).

Centroamérica es una región en

que el gobierno estuviese preparado para cualquier emergencia de este tipo. No obstante ,la tragedia del volcán del fuego demuestra la falta de prevención y de alerta temprana por parte de las autoridades ambientales y de los organismos encargados de la evacuación en este tipo de situaciones. Además, se evidencia un mal manejo posterior por parte del gobierno, puesto que este, representado por el presidente Jimmy Morales sólo ha entregado nuevas viviendas a 168 familias, lo cual representa una cantidad mínima ante las 1000 familias damnificadas que perdieron su hogar desde hace un año (El comercio, 2019).

Las familias han decidido continuar la búsqueda de los cadáveres de sus seres queridos por su propia cuenta, es increíble e inhumano que estas personas que lo perdieron todo no cuenten con más apoyo por parte del Estado para encontrar los restos. San Miguel los Lotes será de ahora en adelante recordado como un pueblo sepultado por el fuego, pero vivirá en la memoria de quienes lo conocieron como un sitio lleno de color en donde algún día vivió una comunidad humilde y tenaz de Guatemala, una comunidad que sobrevive a la adversidad.

Black women are dying in pregnancy and childbirth at an astounding rate. For Black women, the risk of pregnancy-related death is a staggering three to four times higher than for white women. Black women are also twice as likely to suffer from life-threatening pregnancy complications. This disparity transcends income and education levels and cannot be explained away by such risk factors such as genetics or lack of healthcare access.

Black women, however, are not the only women in the US who are experiencing poor maternal care. The United States which boasts how great, powerful and prosperous it is, is one of only 13 nations where the rate of maternal mortality is now worse than it was 25 years ago.

During 2011-2014, the Center for Disease Control found alarming racial disparities in maternal infant mortality deaths nationwide: 12.4 deaths per 100,000 live births for white women compared to a staggering 40 deaths per 100,000 live births for Black women.

New Jersey ranks 47th among all states in maternal mortality with 37.3 deaths per 100,000 live births. In New Jersey Black women are over four times more likely to die from pregnancy-related complications than white women. A Black baby is three times more likely to die before age 1 than a white baby.

Congresswoman Alma Adams (D-NC) wants to reverse this trend as well as reduce the alarming statistics regarding Black maternal mortality. She believes that health care for Black women can only happen if the United States recognizes and addresses persistent bias in its healthcare system and do more to ensure Black women and other women have access to culturally competent, holistic care to reduce preventable maternal mortality. To that end, Congresswoman Adams has introduced legislation in the U.S. House of Representatives entitled the Maternal Care Access and Reducing Emergencies (Maternal CARE) Act . Congresswoman Adams is the founder and co-chair of the Black Maternal Health Caucus.

The Maternal Care Act would establish a \$25 million program to fight maternal bias in healthcare. The new grant program would be directed to medical schools, nursing schools and other healthcare professional training

programs to support evidence-based implicit training that would improve health for Black women by reducing bias in judgement or behavior with an

appropriation of \$125 million to identify high-risk pregnancies and provide mothers with the culturally competent care and resources they



need. The grant program would also assist states to implement medical home demonstration to develop and carry out pregnancy programs. These programs, it is felt, would improve maternal care by incentivizing maternal healthcare providers to deliver integrated healthcare services to pregnant women and new mothers and reduce adverse maternal health outcomes, maternal deaths and racial healthcare disparities in maternal mortality and morbidity. The proposal goes further to assist medical schools with incorporating bias recognition in clinical skills testing by directing the National Academy of Medicine to study and make recommendations.

"We cannot address the Black maternal health crisis facing this country until we address racial disparities in healthcare. The Maternal CARE Act will confront the persistent biases in our health system to ensure Black women have equal access to the quality pre-natal and post-natal care they deserve" stated Congresswoman Adams.

The Maternal Care Act has also been introduced in the U.S. Senate by U.S. Senator Kamala Harris (D-CA). Senator Harris is a candidate for president.



"Martin Luther King, Jr.: Voice for **Equality!**"

The heroes in comic books arrive in fancy costumes.



Their heads are ringed by bubbles that say things like "POW!" and "ZOOM!" and that's when bad guys fall like dead twigs from a tree. BAM! All the heroes in comic books are super-powerful and mighty but here's the thing: as you'll see in the new book "Martin Luther King, Jr.: Voice for Equality!" by James Buckley, Jr. and YouNeek Studios, real heroes sometimes quietly wear suits and ties.

Welcome to this history tour. Your guides are Libby (a.k.a Lady Liberty, the statue) and the boy who will someday be your "Uncle Sam."

Today, they'll take you on a tour of the life of a boy named Mike.

Yes, that was his name at birth: Michael King, Jr., but when Mike was That makes this a story that could a boy, his father changed both their names to honor a religious man. That was also when Martin Luther King, Sr. decided to become a minister. Later, Martin Luther King Jr. did, too. Back then, young King knew that it was wrong to deny someone their rights, based on the color of their skin.

As a child, he vowed to do something about Jim Crow laws someday but it wasn't until he was older and visited Connecticut that he learned what it was like not to be segregated. That trip changed his focus: he was still a man of God, but he'd use his talents

as speechmaker and leader to gain civil rights for African Americans.

It wasn't easy.

King's house was bombed and, although his family was safe, it was scary. His followers and friends were beaten and bloodied in fields, on the streets, and in marches. His life was threatened and that landed him in the hospital once.

And yet, King never gave up; he persevered by reaching out to politicians and other influential people who could help the cause. He planned and marched, even though there were times when he was just plain tired. And he did it until the day he died on a hotel balcony, killed by a man with a gun...

Kids who struggle to read, or who claim they don't like to read may change their tune with "Martin Luther King, Jr.: Voice for Equality!" Parents take note: this isn't your old-school stuffy history book.

Using the younger versions of two historical icons, author James Buckley, Jr. tells the story of Dr. King through comic-book-like illustration and balloon-text, mediums that are familiar to both readers and reluctant readers. Inherently, that makes this a tale kids can relate to, but Buckley Jr. also uses modern language that children understand, which helps get them involved by subtly including them in the emotions inside the story. Crisp illustrations by YouNeek Studios then keeps them engaged.

Black Caucus Members Call For Study of Black Males

Several members of the Congressional Black Caucus have introduced a resolution which calls for the creation of a federal commission to study the challenges facing Black men and boys. In particular, the commission which would be named the Commisdisparate income and wealth levels, school performance at various grade levels, health issues, drug abuse and death rates.

Taking the lead on behalf of the Congressional Black Caucus in introducing and advocating the commission were Congresswoman



sion on the Social Status of Black Men and Boys would study the high rate of homicide, incarceration and other hardships faced by Black males. The commission would be bipartisan and housed within the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights' office and led by a staff director. The 19-member commission would consist of one person outside of federal employment appointed by each of the Senate and House of Representatives majority and minority leaders; the Chair and five additional members of the Congressional Black Caucus with relevant expertise or commitassignments from housing, tee healthcare, education, labor and employment, and justice and civil rights. In addition, to fill the commission, the president would appoint two non-federal employees and the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the federal departments of justice, education, labor, housing and urban development, and health and human services would each appoint one member of their staff to the commission.

The commission would be charged with examining homicide rates, arrest and incarceration rates, violence, poverty, fatherhood, mentorship,

Frederica Wilson (D-FL), Congresswoman Lucy McBath (D-GA), Congressman Cedric Richmond (D-LA) and Congressman Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY).

The creation of the commission has a special importance to Congresswoman McBath whose son was gunned down by a white motorist in Florida in 2012 at the age of 17 for allegedly playing his music too loudly.

"I was teaching him to stand up against unrighteousness and to stand up against injustice. I was preparing him to take his place in this world at the decision-making table as a powerful young Black man," stated Congresswoman McBath.

"My son like so many others, was a victim of implicit bias, and racism and I feel an obligation in my core to address these issues," added Congresswoman McBath.

The resolution has been referred to the House Judiciary Committee for its consideration. In addition to creating a commission, the resolution calls for an annual report to be forwarded to the president, Congress, cabinet and the chairs of relevant Congressional committees. It would also be posted on a centralized federal website for public access.


