Black NJ Ministers Support Tax on Millionaires

TRENTON- Miembros de la comunidad guatemalteca renuevan esfuerzos para ayudar a Everth José Hernández, joven que fue atropellado el pasado 25 de Agosto 2018 y desde esa fecha hasta el día de hoy, no se ha podido recuperar. El Doctor Christian Schumacher, neurólogo especialista de celebro y con muchos años de experiencia, manifestó el pasado miércoles que el cerebro de Everth José tras ser atropellado, quedó tan dañado que no tiene remedio y no da esperanza que pueda recuperarse de la condición vegetativa que actualmente presenta.

En una conferencia telefónica el mismo doctor Schumacher habló

directamente con la Mamá del joven y le dio a conocer sobre esta lamentable noticia.

Al conocer esta situación los miembros de la asociación guatemalteca y quienes están ayudando en esta necesidad, piden ayuda a la comunidad hispana en general para tratar de que Paula Pérez López madre de este joven guatemalteco nuevamente acuda a pedir una visa humanitaria y poder venir a ver a su hijo. "Quiero que me ayuden a ir a ver a mi hijo, quiero tocarle su cabecita y sus manos y pedirle a Dios que le avude a mi gordo" dijo Paula Pérez vía telefónica desde Guatemala. La desesperada madre manifestó que Everth Jose

"Do the right thing or face our collective wrath," was the message delivered by a group of politically-active black ministers to state legislators recently in Trenton. At a press conference at Trenton's Shiloh Baptist Church, Black ministers throughout the state came together to back Governor Phil Murphy's proposal for a tax of the state's millionaires.

Governor Murphy has urged the state legislature to raise taxes on the richest 1% of New Jersey residents, 19,000 people, who make over one million dollars a year to fund property tax relief, investments

in public schools and other priorities which would improve the quality of life for residents of the state. The proposed millionaire's tax which would bring in \$250 million in new revenue is supported by over 70% of New Jersey voters. However, Senate President Steve Sweeney and Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin oppose the millionaire's tax, which was a core tenet of Governor Murphy's 2017 campaign platform. Murphy, Sweeney and Coughlin, are all democrats. The battle over passage of a millionaire's tax is just one of several major battles between Governor Murphy and his allies on the one hand and State Senate President Sweeney and his south jersey brain trust on the other. It has become nasty and

contentious. The conflict has become very personal and political and is affecting public policy. But it is also about power and who will run the state democratic party and state government.

State Senator Shirley Turner, whose district includes Trenton, is squarely behind Gov. Murphy's millionaire's tax. However, Assemblywoman Verlina Reynolds-Jackson and Assemblyman Anthony Verrell have instead sided with Sweeney and Coughlin against Murphy and the overwhelming majority of their constituents.

Race and Racism

(1) A system of thought, speech and action operated by people who classify themselves as "white" and who use deceit, violence and/or the threat of violence to subjugate, use and/or abuse people classified as non-white under conditions that promote the practice of falsehood, non-justice and incorrectness in one or more areas of activity for the ultimate purpose of maintaining, expanding and/or refining the practice of White Supremacy (racism).

(2) Unjust speech, action and/or inaction based on the color and/or non-color of persons and/or factors associated with the color and/or non-color of persons.

(3) White Supremacy.



Reservations begin July 8

WEST WINDSOR— Residents and visitors to Mercer County will now have a chance to camp out and enjoy a unique perspective of the park system with the creation of an overnight campground in the East Picnic Area of Mercer County Park.

County Executive Brian M. Hughes and the Mercer County Park Commission announced the opening of the campground at a ribbon-cutting ceremony July 1. The facility features 10 campsites, six with lean-to structures and four that will accommodate a tent. The hike-in campground can hold six campers per site and has

Racism impacts your health

Health impacts from anti-Black racism and anti-Indigeneity are often dismissed or kept silent by health scholars and health care workers.

Outside in public: Smiling, dressed real fine, manners on point. I am well schooled on how to be respectful, how to take up space, how to use silence when necessary. Travelling home on transit listening to music to drown out my day - filled with injustices from the minute I left my "sanctuary" ten hours earlier. Fumbling for keys, nearly pushing the door down to my home. All I experienced outside threatens to crash down my door and engulf my insides and swallow me whole. My breath struggles to calm itself. Grief shadows me through the hallway. I self-talk my way into the kitchen, slipping my armour off; my thick silver bangle hits the floor, the sound awakening me to reality. I am home. I sit still for a minute and contemplate how I will go out again to face the monster of anti-Black racism. I drink my tea quickly, and begin to make dinner. - Feb 9, 2018, author's journal

Witnessing and hearing stories about racism can impact your health. The feelings evoked can make you ill if not processed.

The recent news of Tina Fontaine's trial and the acquittal of Gerald Stanley, a white farmer accused of killing a young Indigenous man, Colten Boushie, of the Red Pheasant First Nation are examples of the Canadian legal system's commitment to the Indian Act and colonial dominance. This ongoing colonial dominance has

entry to trails throughout Mercer County Park, which offers activities including bike rentals, boating, fishing and hiking that are accessible from the campground.

"With this new addition, the public can now enjoy an overnight stay in one of our premier parks," Mr. Hughes said. "The campsites are a wonderful way to experience an outdoor retreat, and I encourage residents to take advantage of this new amenity."

Campsites are available for rental beginning July 8 through Community Pass for \$20 per night with a maximum stay of seven consecutive days. Each campsite includes a campfire ring, picnic table and charcoal grill. Full restrooms, water service, playground and trash disposal station

a transgenerational trauma impact on the health of Indigenous and colonized peoples.

Two recent examples that indicate the kind of violence that Black people experience: A school that allowed police to shackle a Black six-year old girl's wrists and ankles; a children's aid system that put a child refugee from Somalia into foster care yet never applied for his Canadian citizenship, so years later he received deportation orders to a country where he does not speak the language.

The impact of this colonialism and anti-Black racism on the health of Black and Indigenous peoples is elongated and insidious. We navigate systems, structures and communities that perpetuate abhorrence towards us in all aspects of our lives.

Experiencing and fighting such systems for justice for our children, ourselves and our community members has devastating effects on our health.

As a health and human rights researcher, therapist and professor who has explored the deep implications of racism, I would like to share some insights into the impacts of racism on our health.

My hope is that by doing so I create dialogue and encourage communities to continue to voice their experiences of violence and racism — in order to demand changes and ultimately create more supports.

Violence is a continuum

National Minority Mental Health Awareness Month

July is National Minority Mental Health Awareness Month. Congress proclaimed July as a special month to focus attention on minority mental health awareness with a desire to improve access to mental health treatment and services through increased public awareness in July of 2008. Since 2008, various organizations have hosted a variety of events and activities in communities across the country each year around the issue of mental health and its effects on racial and ethnic minority populations.

According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration:

in 2017 over 70% of Black adolescents with a major depressive episode did not receive treatment for their condition, almost 25% of adolescents with a major depressive episode were Hispanic/Latino, Asian American adults were less likely to use mental health services than any other racial/ethnic group, nearly 1 in 10 American Indian or Alaska Native young adults had serious thoughts of suicide and 1 in 7 Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander adults had a diagnosable mental illness.

Despite advances in health equity, disparities in mental health care persist. The Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality reports that racial and ethnic minority groups in the U.S. are less likely to have access to mental health services, use community mental health services and are more likely, to use emergency departments and receive lower quality care.

Poor mental health care access and quality contribute to poor mental health outcomes, including suicide, among racial and ethnic minority populations.

There is a mental health problem in the US. It is particularly acute in the Black and Latino communities. It is not an issue which the Black and Latino communities in the US want to acknowledge, but it must not only acknowledge the issue, it must address it.

To that end, The Nubian News recognizes July as National Minority Mental Health Awareness Month and commends and supports those groups in Trenton and throughout the nation committed to improving the mental health of Blacks and other people of color.

Trenton Public Schools, Where Do We Go From Here?

Although I am a current member of the Trenton School Board and former its President; I do not write this op-ed with the approval of, or on behalf of the Trenton School Board, but as a concerned resident and taxpayer of the City of Trenton, NJ.

Don't our children deserve a quality education? If the City of Trenton is to rise, it will be on the shoulders of the Trenton Public School System. Parents move their families to areas where there is a strong educational system. Parents want assurances that their children will receive a quality education. Want to increase the City tax base? Want companies to relocate to Trenton? That work starts by transforming the school system.

Trenton Public Schools has now had 8 Superintendents (permanent, interim and acting) in the past 11 years. I recall two years ago having conversations with Dr. Fred McDowell, a young, new Superintendent of Trenton Public Schools about transformation. At the time, my heart ached for the children of Trenton because 7 out of 10 students could not read on grade level, and 9 out of 10 students could not perform math on grade level. The district's performance on QSAC (DOE - Quality System of Accountability Continuum) was 27% on Curriculum and Instruction against a target of 100%. Of course, student performance on the PARCC assessment was poor. High school graduation rates were below desired and less than 30% of high school graduates attended a postsecondary institution and many of those that did were not prepared to be successful. The district was at the mercy of transportation vendors because a couple of years earlier financial challenges required the selling of the district's bus fleet.

Dr. McDowell is leaving the district as of 8/30/2019 and the local commentary embraces this news as something to be celebrated. Too often, people respond to his departure with unhelpful guips

like, "about time", "why wait until August", "this is great news", or "I guess we got rid of him". I wonder why? Let's review the district progress over the past two years:

- QSAC performance on Curriculum and Instruction improved from a low of 27% in 2017 to a high of 72% in 2019
- In the 2018-19 school year across all elementary schools 61% of students improved on grade level in reading.
- 2017-18 Math proficiency increased from 3% to 10.8%. 2018-19 Preliminary data indicates Trenton students are continuing to increase their performance in Math:
 - Grade 3 Proficiency increased from 14% to 17%, which is the 1st Benchmark Year for College and Career Readiness
 - Geometry Proficiency increased from 14% to 22%
 - Algebra 2 Proficiency increased from 5% to 12%
- Students awarded the Seal of Biliteracy went from 21 in 2018, to 53 in 2019
- Curriculum has begun to align with the Amistad Act passed into law in 2002, requiring African American History be taught in every school district in New Jersey
- For the second year in a row the district has received the ASBO award for excellence in financial accounting, only one of two districts in the entire state to do so.
- Over the past two years, 9 schools have come out of status which means they are no longer subject to state directed interventions
- After having only three school buses in the Spring of 2017 and being at the mercy of transportation vendors, the district now

- owns 24 state of the art school buses.
- Due to effective transportation cost management and efficiency, (61) districts scored as Excels, spending significantly less than predicted. Trenton's decision to tier its transportation system allowed the Trenton School District to be ranked 21st in the State.
- In September the district will launch the program entitled the Trenton Restorative Academy (TRA). The purpose of the Trenton Restorative Academy initiative is to provide a positive, nurturing environment for students that have not been unsuccessful in a traditional educational setting. Students will develop holistic social and emotional skills in a least restrictive environment and transition back to their sending school upon program completion.
- The Trenton Global Academy is designed for English Language Learners (ELLs) aged 14- 21, who have recently arrived in the United States. The Trenton Global Academy Newcomer program will offer these students an opportunity to engage in an Individualized Program Plan (IPP) of study that builds academic mastery while receiving intensive supports to acquire English Language proficiency. This program addresses the need to prevent long-term ELLs by offering an opportunity to transition into English only classrooms with ESL support before the required exit score of 4.5.
- The district rehired 60 paraprofessionals that were terminated due to budget constraints.

- Over the past two years where other districts have had layoffs, the Trenton School District has hired over 200 employees.
- On June 28, 2019 the district will purchase 500 Perry Street, the current location of the Ninth Grade Academy. The district will carry zero debt and there will be no increase in the taxes of Trenton taxpayers to fund the acquisition.

In my opinion, there has clearly been an effort, or a conspiracy, to discredit Dr. McDowell and purposefully ignore/discount the progress that has been made ultimately in an attempt to relieve him of his responsibilities as Superintendent. This much was obvious dating back to August 2017 through the last Board meeting in June. I have heard comments like, "things are a mess", "things are worse than I have ever seen", "he is a tyrant", "he is arrogant", and "he does not care about the students of Trenton". I wonder why? What is at the root of this mindset and behavior? Clearly, it is not what is in the best interest of the students. When I think about Dr. McDowell's vision and roadmap for the district, he mentioned desiring to institute a magnet school for Trenton's gifted and high performing students to compete with the charter schools. He wanted to institute an early college school that would allow students to graduate with a high school diploma and an Associates degree at the same time. My concern is that we may never see these things become a reality. There is still lots of work to be done, and progress to be made especially in the area of Special Education. My sincere hope is that Trenton will ultimately secure through the Superintendent search a candidate who is an instructional leader that will build on the progress the district has

algunos incluso faltando a más de 70 plenarias, esto aunado a las vacaciones de tres meses que reciben estos funcionarios, demuestra que durante 5 meses del año estos congresistas han recibido su sueldo sin presentarse a trabajar.

Es triste y lamentable que en los países del cono sur los funcionarios del Estado que son quienes podrían encargarse de la correcta ejecución de recursos y el desarrollo de los territorios decidan anteponer sus intereses propios y perjudicar a una nación entera. Sin duda, esta es una de las razones por las que América Latina tiene un desarrollo más lento, pues a pesar de ser una región con países ricos en recursos naturales, mano de obra y creatividad, cuenta con una administración que se aprovecha de los más pobres para enriquecer a los más ricos.

"BTTM FDRS"



Your first place all your own needs to be ah-mazing.

Big-screen TV for gaming. Fridge for snacks and drinks. Sofa for kicking back, a few good chairs, and places to ... and into a creature that wrapped Cynthia into itself and overtook her body.

Unaware of the deadly organism that her best friend was fighting in the basement of the apartment building, Darla hung out with the famous rapper down the hall until she started noticing a lot of weird things. There were cameras in the apartments, and



hold your stuff. Maybe your parents will help out. Maybe the landlord will let you paint. Maybe, as in "BTTM FDRS" by Ezra Claytan Daniels and Ben Passsmore, your new place will be interesting.

When it came time to finally get her own apartment, Darla didn't bother to look far. She grew up in Chicago's Bottomyards and though it still wasn't the safest place on Earth, the former ghetto was gentrifying. That counted for something, right?

Her father hated the building; he warned her away and yeah, it was super-creepy but the rent was good. The place was roomy, but also had room for improvement: as Darla moved in, the electricity kept going out and her friend, Cynthia, messed up the plumbing. Even so, Darla had neighbors: a famous rapper moved in down the hall and she met an elderly lady and her son from downstairs.

Was it the stress of the move, then, or the stress of living in the place itself that made Darla fight with Cynthia soon after Darla spent her first night alone? Who knows, but they argued and the friendship was over – or Darla thought it was, anyhow, but Cynthia had second thoughts. She snuck back into Darla's apartment, got totally creeped out, hid in a cabinet, and fell down a tunnel... eerie noises. The building superintendent was super-creepy and the whole place was like a dungeon. And then she found Cynthia – or, at least, what was left of her.

Was there time for Darla to get out alive?

If you're not familiar with graphic novels – which are basically full-length stories in comic art form – "BTTM FDRS" might take a bit of getting used to. It doesn't help that this tale starts abruptly, and with racism that feels like a slap.

Keep reading. That slap ultimately turns into a shiver.

With color-blocked panels and not a lot of fluff or dialogue, authors Ezra Claytan Daniels and Ben Passmore take readers into what could be perceived as commentary on today's social problems, or sly pokes at gentrification and modern segregation, in the future or now. The story is sly, almost backhanded and, much like the creature in this book, eats its way into your imagination until your hands sweat, your eyes dart wildly, and you realize that you've been holding your breath.

Let it go. You're safe in your chair (for now) but if you're 15-and-up and you love graphic horror novels, here's your next scare. For you, "BTTM FDRS" is ah-mazing.

the press conference was held, when asked, indicated that he would reach out to Reynolds-Jackson and Verrell to urge them to support the millionaire's tax. Rev. Armstrong said the preachers would go to their congregations and their communities if needed, but they first planned to pull legislators over to the side with one-on-one chats.

Several other ministers were planning a similar approach but also warned if their request was not met that they were prepared to take additional action. Such additional efforts mentioned were opposing the reelection of legislators from districts where their churches were located and their congregations lived. Other efforts included possible 2021 running primary challengers against non-compliant legislators.

"We ask that the legislature cooperate with the governor, and if it doesn't happen, then we'll take it to the community," said Rev. Maurice Jean, President of the New Jersey Association of Haitian Ministers.

It should be noted that the location of the ministers' press conference was the same location were the Rev. S. Howard Woodson served as the pastor. Dissatisfied with the treatment of Blacks, Woodson became politically active. He was elected to the Assembly in 1963, a year before the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 was signed into office.

Woodson would later become the state's first Black Assembly Speaker and the first Black Speaker in the nation since Reconstruction. He presided at a time when Democrats supported politically risky tax increases to fund public education in poor school districts.

Policing the Police

From a Black family violently held at gunpoint in Phoenix, AZ, to an officer fatally shooting a Black man recently in South Bend, IN, there continues to be a rash of police-related incidents that have led to accusations of police misconduct and racism. Trenton like most urban communities has had its share of accusations of police abuse, misconduct and racism. Such police-related abuse, misconduct and racism would become a thing of the past if Senator Kamala Harris (D-GA) and some of her colleagues have their way. Senator Harris along with several have introduced legislation in Congress which would encourage improved training for police officers and use of independent investigation and prosecution to eliminate inherent conflicts of interest.

New Jersey does not have a detailed system for public reporting of allegations of police misconduct and abuse, therefore there is no accurate number of police abuse and misconduct statistics for the city of Trenton or any other area in the state.

The legislation, entitled the Police Training and Independent Review Act, would create a financial incentive for states to require training for law enforcement officials on fair and impartial policing as well as best practices for working with members of the community who are disabled and mentally ill. It would also encourage communities to use independent prosecutors to investigate law enforcement officials' use of deadly force by authorizing the U.S. Attorney General to award grants to states that require an independent investigation and, if warranted, prosecution in cases where one or more of the alleged offenses result in death or serious bodily harm.

"It is imperative that we address implicit bias and help to create bonds of trust between police and the communities they serve. It will save lives," said Senator Harris, who is also a candidate for president. "I'm proud to support the Police Training and Independent Review Act, which builds on my work as California ment agents and the people they are sworn to serve and protect. The fact that the Police Training and Independent Review Act requires training for law enforcement officers on fair and impartial policing will help build the essential trust that is crucial to the safety and security of our communities."

Attorney General in implementing the first statewide implicit bias training program for law enforcement and advocating for teams within the California Department of Justice to investigate officer-involved shootings."

The types of independent investigation and prosecution of law enforcement that would be eligible for financial incentives under the Police Training and Independent Review Act include: the use of an independent agency, civilian review board or outside law enforcement department, such as the State Police, responsible for independently investigating and prosecuting all officer use of force allegations; appointment of the State Attorney General, or a special prosecutor overseen by the State Attorney General, responsible for conducting the criminal investigation and prosecution and the use of an independent prosecutor, who does not reside or work in the same county as the county where the officer's use of force was committed.

"We've lost too many young men and women—from Chicago to Champaign to Ferguson and around the nation—in tragic and preventable police-involved deaths," said Senator Tammy Duckworth (D-IL), chief sponsor of the legislation. "Families like Laquan McDonald's that have experienced heartbreak are no less deserving of justice than any other family, but too often they don't get it." The legislation is supported by the NAACP and the ACLU.

"The NAACP is pleased to support this important legislation," said Hilary O. Shelton, Director of the NAACP Washington Bureau and the Senior Vice President for Policy and Advocacy. "Upon enactment, this legislation would clearly begin to help restore the much needed trust and integrity between law enforcement agents and the people they are sworn to serve and protect. 
