Trenton, New Jersey: Servants Endeavoring To Empower and Develop (S.E.E.D) 2019 Atlanta College Tour will begin on April 22 through the 25th. SEED will explore career opportunities in the communication and broadcasting field with their first stop to Radio One-Atlanta, the largest radio station in Atlanta Ga. They will also visit Core Communicators of Atlanta as they learn the business and air side of broadcasting. They will also get the opportunity to speak with radio personalities and possibly go live on air representing Trenton NJ.

The tour will consist of college visits to Clark Atlanta University, Morehouse College, and Georgia Tech to enhance their educational experience. They will enjoy lunch on the college campus to enhance their full college experience during the tour.

The young men will start each day with a motivational fitness exercise led by Balanced Warrior, Brother Solomon Dinkins, a long time SEED mentor. Mr. Dinkins teach: movement is medicine.

The SEED MLK Breakfast is an annual fundraiser designed to offset the cost of the college tour which includes roundtrip airfare, comfortable lodging, a night of fine dining, bus service to Philadelphia Airport, and a rental van during our stay in Atlanta.

The tour would not be complete without the SEED unity climb to the top of Stone Mountain. Once arriving to the top we will debrief about the trip and end with a prayer of unity.

We have alumni SEED mentees who are currently enrolled in college or are college graduates who have benefitted from the SEED Atlanta Experience. 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TWW is meeting federal and state water-quality standards.

We are pleased to report that our Disinfection Byproducts Reduction Plan, launched in the second half of 2018, has significantly reduced the levels of Disinfection Byproducts (DBPs), specifically Haloacetic Acids (HAA5s) and Trihalomethanes (TTHMs), in our drinking water. The levels—16.4 and 23.2 micrograms per liter (ug/L) respectively—are now below state and federal Safe Drinking Water Act standards, which are 60 micrograms per liter for HAA5s and 80 micrograms per liter for TTHMs. Take a look at our sampling data from February 2018-2019.

We are maintaining water quality, strengthening our day-to-day operations and advancing important capital projects: rolling out our corrosion-control project and our Lead Service Line Replacement Program, which replaces the lead or galvanized water service lines at private residences with safer copper lines. And, we are finalizing the hiring of new customer service representatives to eliminate long hold times for our customers. Water-quality excellence. It's our sole purpose.

Sit Down with Mayor Gusciora

TNN - For water public safety reasons are you and Trenton City Council willing to pass a resolution like Newark, NJ has in progress to replace all lead water pipes throughout their city?

Mayor - We have already started a program for lead line replacement of pipe. We will be doing 7% per year. We just bonded \$15 million that we can offer homeowners to replace their pipes. Not only ours in the middle of



the street but the connecting pipes that go to each individual

house. Normally that's the homeowner's responsibility, so we're going to be doing it at a reduced cost.

Keep in mind there may be soldering lead in the pipes. That same soldering lead is also in the private pipes as well.

TNN - Have you spoken to Principal Grant concerning the parents walk through of the new Trenton Central High School Building?

Mayor - Absolutely. That was a great idea and we think it's not only important for students, but also for parents to know what's in the building and what to expect. There are a number of academies in the high school; vocational, academics, stem program which is science technology and cosmetology. Also

hospitality, restaurant and food services. Parents will be able to see first hand the facilities provided in the building for their children.

TNN - Mayor Gus are you aware that Chicago has elected Lori Lightfoot as mayor?

Mayor - Absolutely. She will be great for the city of Chicago which needs change. So it's great to have a woman in charge of a major American city. We're real excited about her tenure.

TNN - It is a strong possibility that Chicago may have a woman police chief.

Mayor - There is also a strong possibility that the city of Trenton may have a woman police chief as well.

TNN - If women police chiefs are managing big cities such as Boston, Detroit, San Francisco, Washington, DC and Seattle, then Trenton city council should accept a woman police chief as well.

> Mayor - There is an important aspect with having women in leadership. Typically, they're mothers who have a great sense of community, and a maternal sense for safety and detail which a lot of men lack. So, I'm all for having women in leadership. They also tend to be a little more honest. TNN - All these senseless world wars are based on decisions of men. If we include women in decision making then we bring compassion to the table. The genocide of unarmed men of color

being shot and killed by police is under the leadership of men police chiefs, who lack compassion because they refuse to include women in leadership decision making.

Mayor - Absolutely.

TNN - Has Trenton Water Works begun to hire?

Mayor - Absolutely. We hired 30 new workers. We started out with 70 vacancies. We had a job fair recently at City Hall. 1500 applicants came through there. We are also working with the county college to give training to fulfill requirements for some work at the water works. Some of the jobs are technical and applicants may need

an advanced degree or certification to work in areas like testing. Mercer County College did not offer those programs. We're working with Dr. Wan to offer them

to make sure Trenton residents can get labor entry jobs, and also advanced jobs because of the advanced training. Keep in mind the three highest paying jobs in the city are police, firefighter and at the waterworks. So I want to make sure the word gets out to offer our residents jobs in the water department.

the government intervened with programs, with resources, which gave people hope. The hope of a better life for themselves and their children turned many of the violent into 'respectable, tax-paying citizens.' It took time, focus and a trillions of dollars to turn white America into what it is today. Going back to 1830 The Indian Removal Act gave white settlers land on which to build a secure future. Then in 1862 the Homestead Act followed suit giving white Americans millions of acres of land. When you have enough to eat you face tomorrow differently.

In 1935 the landmark Social Security Act provided retirement money to white people. Also that year the Wagner Act gave white people the right to bargain collectively in unions which could legally outlaw non-white membership. But it was the Federal Housing Administration which changed white America forever. This gave white people the financial backing to buy homes which helped generate much of the wealth that white families have today. While specifically excluding most non-white people.

Then came the GI Bill after WWII which moved many whites into the suburbs, and educated them for free. The value of the 'welfare' white people have received from the American government can be measured in the 100s of trillion dollars. These resources changed the trajectory of white American's lives. With their new found wealth came an increase sense of hope. With hope, violence dropped.

The lesson here is resources change everything.

With resources, violence in Black/ Brown communities will drop. People who have a fair chance of doing better tomorrow don't take the chances hopeless people do.

So what can a brother do? First we must replace the system of white supremacy/racism which has given so many resources to white America and denied the same to non-white Americans. Replacing that system is first and foremost. At every opportunity, sir, you and all of us must speak out against this system of Black and white. Without that there is nothing that will ever happen.


We have to fight for, ask for, beg for, reparations. Our community needs to be 'repared'. With the money, the resources, we can do for self.

With a wealth gap of \$250,000 between a white family and a Black family, every American Descendant of Slaves should get at least \$250,000 tax free, in reparations for the holocaust America has visited on us. With that wealth you will see a marked decline in violence in Tren-


ton and across America.







Recall Is Clearly An Option

For reasons known only by the five members of Trenton City Council who voted against advancing a redevelopment proposal by Mayor Reed Gusciora to bring 400 jobs to the city, Trenton residents are forced to wonder why.

A company reached out to the City of Trenton with a redevelopment plan to buy a historic, dilapidated building in the Roebling complex in Trenton with plans to move hundreds of jobs to the city from a facility in White Plains, New York and pledge an investment of \$4 million to the project. The property intended to be redeveloped has been vacant for 40 years. The City Council in a five to two vote however decided not to support advancement of the redevelopment plan.

Four hundred jobs for Black and Latino workers and others lost. Four hundred jobs inside the City of Trenton. No need to commute long hours or have a car. A majority of City Council members seemed to be saying, "We got our jobs, to hell with the rest of you" when they voted against the project.

The five members who voted against advancing the proposal argued that Council, not the mayor, is the redevelopment authority. So members of Council, where is your plan for redeveloping the site, any site?

The current City Council took office in July 2018 and has been in office just over nine months. From the outset the Council has engaged in petty squabbling, personal and character attacks on each other, cat fighting and other conduct normally associated with middle school age students with hormones raging on steroids. Dysfunction, schism and cliques, egos on steroids and confusion reign supreme only nine months into a four year term. Perhaps this is what the voters were expecting when the few that showed up to the polls cast their votes. Maybe that is why so many decided not to vote. They had seen past councils conducting

themselves in a similar vein. Those that were expecting better, who hoped that a new council would take the business of the people seriously, must be shaking their heads in disbelief and betrayal.

This latest fiasco by Council goes beyond its regular bizarre conduct. The Council's latest action is almost criminal. Unfortunately, stupidity is not a crime. Neither is incompetence. Trenton residents who want a better Trenton for themselves, their children and families can wait for the next council election in three years or they can seek another option. That option is named recall; sometimes called recall referendum.

The recall process is a relatively simple one. All that is needed is for three, just three, Trenton voters to say enough is enough and agree to allow their names to be used as the recall committee to initiate the recall process. Recall law requires that a recall cannot take place more than 50 days prior to an elected official being in office one year. Therefore, the earliest the recall process could begin officially would be around the middle of May. However, Trenton residents can immediately begin the conversation about the need to recall Lucille, Ethel, Amos, Andy, Abbott and Costello.

The recall process would require only a quarter of the registered voters of a ward to sign a petition supporting recall of their Council member. For an At-Large member, signatures from one quarter of the voters of the city is required.

Trenton residents deserve far better than they are receiving from the current Council. Waiting three years until the next election may not be the best option for change. As they say "If you can't change the people, than you change the people." It is time for a change. The recall of members of Council may be the best and the smartest option.



It happened the first time you heard Beyoncé Knowles, before she won



a Grammy, before she added to her life with a man and motherhood. It happened the first time you saw her, a skinny child with a mispronounced name, and in "Queen Bey," a book of essays edited by Veronica Chambers, you'll want to say that name again.

"What might a Black girl be in this world?"

That's a question Veronica Chambers says she's spent her lifetime asking. The answer arrived in the songs of a performer who "has no interest in separating herself from the struggle of being a Black woman..." That singer, Beyoncé Knowles-Carter, "is the greatest performer alive," according to Luvvie Ajayi, one essayist here When Beyoncé was first seen (on TV's Star Search in 1993), viewers recognized her talent. Even then, she was "our generation" and that never changed: these days, she's "named the pain of... Black women who... love Black men..." Through her actions and music, she's shown that "Black men's apologies to Black women matter." Writer Ylonda Gault says that there were times when Beyoncé's life eerily paralleled Gault's. Meredith Broussard calls Beyoncé "a constant presence in my own life."

She's a businesswoman who reportedly has a climate-controlled archive of every print and digital bit of press with her name in it. She's a writer, mother, feminist, actress, and award-winner; a "hard-work-

> ing professional," a champion for gay rights, an inspiration for young Black girls, and a comfort for women who've miscarried. And she's a dancer: who among us hasn't memorized the incredible moves seen in her music videos?

> Naysayers and haters might scoff, but for a fan, there's probably nothing Beyoncé can't do. Says writer Edward Enninful, "she's above trends. She can't be put in a box. Frankly, she can do whatever she wants."

> Let's stop right here a second: if you barely know who Beyoncé is and can't name at least five of her songs, you can put your newspaper down now. Go do something else, because this book is not for you.

Come to think, it's not a book for mere casual fans, either. No, "Queen Bey" is a book for

rabid, die-hard, sing-all-the-songs fans who know what the Hive is, and exist in it. It's for the readers who've listened to Beyoncé's albums and watched all the videos over and over again, because all the contributors to this book have done that, too. It's for fans who've played the "Michael, Whitney, or Beyoncé?" game.

Just beware: this over-the-edge rhetoric here can get excessively florid, sometimes making Knowles-Carter seem like a deity, and that lack of perspective can mar the messages behind the outpouring of love. Readers with a tendency to roll their eyes might do that here, Beyoncé fan or not.

Keep that in mind when you see this book. If you're a sometime follower, you'll probably be happier just taking a pass. If you can't get enough of "Queen Bey," you'll like it and you shoulda put a bookmark in it.

having unexplained aches and pains, feeling helpless or hopeless, smoking, drinking or using drugs more than usual, feeling unusually confused, forgetful, on edge, angry, upset, worried or scared, yelling or fighting with family and friends, experiencing severe mood swings that cause problems in relationships, having persistent thoughts and memories you can't get out of your head, hearing voices or believing things that are not true, thinking of harming yourself or others and the inability to perform daily tasks like taking care of your kids or getting to work or school.

MLB And Black Players

There was a time when major league baseball was king. A time when it was the national pastime. A time when the game was exciting, thrilling, an afternoon delight and an evening of enchantment. Baseball had character and was full of characters. It made dreams, it gave hope, it created miracles. Baseball was also colorful.

Baseball was most exciting and also most colorful during its golden age which occurred shortly after the end of World War II when Jackie Robinson, Larry Doby and other Black players, who prior to 1947 were banned from the major leagues, took the game to another level. Black ball players like Robinson, Doby, Don Newcombe, Willie Mays, Ernie Banks, Hank Aaron, Roy Campanella, Satchel Paige, Juan Marichal, Frank Robinson, Bob Gibson, Orlando Cepeda, Elston Howard, Roberto Clemente, Jim Gilliam and so many more brought a certain artistic almost musical like dimension to

the game in a way it was not played before.

Prior to the arrival of Black ball players on the big league diamond, baseball was basically a whole lot of players striking out and the occasional home run. The game changed radically for the better when Black players dominated the game with their exceptional athletic skills and the color and flair they brought. The game became more than strikeouts and the occasional home run . Now there was the stolen base, triple, inside the park home run, hit and run, sacrifice and suicide squeeze and perhaps the most electrifying play of any sport, the steal of home. Gravity defying catches and rocket missile throws from the field by Black players, baseball became not just exciting, it was a spiritual experience.

However, recently, something happened on the way to the ballpark. Baseball lost its color. Baseball is back to how it was played prior to Robinson and other Black players. The excitement is gone, the type of play that gave baseball its excitement is gone and with few exceptions, its Black players. In 2017, only 7.1 percent of the players playing major league baseball were Black, a historic low. The game in many ways has returned back to the days of strikeouts and the occasional home run. "Star" players hit 30 to 40 home runs, striking out 200 plus times a season with .250 averages, and receive multi-million dollar salaries.

Major League Baseball (MLB) maintains that it wants to see more Black players enter the big leagues. However, it would appear from its marketing efforts that it really is just lip service. Case in point, the reigning American League Most Valuable Player (MVP) is a Black ball player named Mookie Betts. Betts lead his team, the Boston Red Sox, to an incredible year becoming the American League and World Series champs.

Lesser players would have, and are, featured on MLB commercials promoting the league and the new season, but Mookie Betts is not one of them. What is with that MLB? Not marketing Betts means MLB is missing out on an opportunity to increase interest of the game to Black youth. Betts is a three-time All-Star with three Gold Glove awards on his mantle, and he's coming off an unreal 2018 offensive campaign when the 26-year-old hit .346 with 32 home runs and 47 doubles while stealing 30 bases. His face should be the face of Major League Baseball.

Was there a decision rendered years ago in secrecy that too many Black ball players was not financially good for the game? Is it financial or is it racism that MLB fails to highlight current Black stars? Is that the reason that Black and Latino players like Manny Machado and Yasiel Puig are singled out for undue and harshier criticism from TV and newspaper sport commentators and writers? Is it purely unintentional or is it just purely racist? MLB, inquiring minds want to know.
