Will this be another Y2K, Mayan 2012 apocalypse scenario with a whole lot of sound and fury signifying nothing? Or a 9/11 moment which changes history and society forever remains to be seen. My bet, and I am a betting man, that this will



be a 9/11 moment which will usher in a new day and new way of living.

Prior to 9/11 having to take off one's shoes and belt to go through an airport boarding area was unheard of. Now that, and so much more is the new normal. Americans were willing to give up personal privacy in numerous ways for safety and security.

We can expect similar radical changes regarding personal privacy as well as many other changes to life as we once knew it. Some of these changes have been in the works prior to the coronavirus. However its onset will only serve to accelerate those trends and changes.

Take for example online courses offered by colleges and universities. Most colleges and universities have been offering them for years. Trenton Public Schools District, like others throughout the US providing kindergarten to 12 grade instruction, have been forced to cancel classes and

have students receive remote learning instruction by way of Google Classroom due to the coronavirus. Unfortunately, the Trenton Public Schools District, like the federal government, was totally unprepared to handle the coronavirus. A significant number of students do not have access to the technology (computers, laptops, notebooks, tablets) which would have allowed them to use Google Classroom. Some students that lack internet access were given

instruction packages that were hastily prepared by teachers that ended up going to the wrong students. For example, there have been reports of third grade students receiving instruction packages made for kindergarten students and vice versa.

If nothing else, it is hoped that the school district's inept response to the coronavirus will force school administrators, board of education members, and other Trenton educational, political, social and business leaders to get serious about educating Trenton youth. This is 2020 not 1950. Every Trenton public school student needs to own the technology that allows them to compete against students

throughout the US and the world. In addition, if education administrators are serious about involving parents in the education system, they should make sure that all pronouncements by the district are in both English and Spanish. They must find a way to make it happen.

People throughout the US are being urged not shake hands out of concern that the coronavirus can be spread that way. Will shaking hands, man hugs and greeting kisses return after the coronavirus is no more? Or will such personal conduct become artifacts of yesteryear? Will "Hello" and "What's happening?" be replaced with "Healthy?" as the new greeting? How about attending public gatherings like movies, sports events and religious services? Will people go back to business as usual or will such activities go the way of drive-in movies, video stores and beepers? Will Netflix dates replace movie theater date nights? Will working from home become the norm? If people do go back to public activities will they be willing to submit to security health checks prior to being admitted?

TRENTON-Hay que recordar a la comunidad que hoy miércoles 1 de abril del 2020, se conmemora el Día del Censo en todos los 50 estados, el Distrito de Columbia y cinco territorios (Puerto Rico, Samoa Americana, la Mancomunidad de las Islas Marianas del Norte, Guam y las Islas Vírgenes). Está estipulado en la Constitución y lo dirige la Oficina del Censo, una agencia gubernamental sin afiliación política. Para esta fecha, todos los hogares habrán recibido -Sobre el sexo de cada persona en el hogar.

-Sobre la edad de cada persona en el hogar.

- -Sobre la raza de cada persona en el hogar.
- -Sobre si una persona en el hogar es de origen hispano, latino, etc.
- -Sobre el parentesco de cada persona en el hogar.

Durante el mes de mayo la Oficina del Censo comienza a visitar hogares que no han respondido al Censo del 2020 para asegurarse de que todos sean contados. Para el mes de



una invitación para participar en el Censo del 2020. Una vez que le llegue la invitación, debe responder e incluir a todos los que viven en hogar; esto incluye todos los niños y niñas que viven en su hogar, incluyendo nietos, sobrinos y sobrinas, y los hijos de amigos. Niños que dividen su tiempo entre dos hogares, si viven con usted el 1 de abril del 2020. Recién nacidos, incluso los que nazcan el 1 de abril del 2020, o los que todavía estén en el hospital en este día. Puede hacerlo por internet, por teléfono o por correo. Es importante que esto se realice ya que los resultados determinan la distribución de fondos federales para los estados y las comunidades. ¿QUÉ ES EL CENSO 2020?

Un Censo es una encuesta que cuenta a cada persona en los Estados Unidos, lo cual ayuda al gobierno a tomar decisiones importantes que afectan nuestras vidas. La Constitución de los EEUU requiere que cada diez años, cada persona que vive en los EEUU tiene que ser contada: todas las edades, raices, y

¿Por qué es importante la participación en el Censo?

El resultado del Censo es utilizado para decidir a dónde enviar más de \$22 billones en fondos federales para escuelas, hospitales, proyectos de infraestructura – y más en Nueva Jersey. Esos números tienen impacto por diez años, hasta el próximo Censo en el 2030. No contar a ciertas poblaciones en el 2020 implica menos fondos por diez años para nuestras comunidades. Los resultados del Censo también son utilizados para decidir la cantidad de representación en el gobierno federal para Nueva Jersey. Nueva Jersey perdió un miembro en el Congreso y un voto electoral después del Censo 2010, en parte a causa de los números que resultaron del Censo.

¿Cuándo es el Censo y qué necesito saber?

En la mayoria de los casos, las personas recibirán cartas por correo a partir de Marzo y Abril del 2020 con instrucciones sobre cómo responder – por internet, por teléfono o por correo. Responder al Censo es fácil. La mayoría de las familias lo terminan en diez minutos. Si una casa no responde antes de fines de Abril del 2020, un representante de la Oficina del Censo, llamado un "enumerador", visitará la casa para hacer las preguntas del Censo en persona. Eso es para prevenir una cuenta incorrecta.

¿Qué pregunta el Censo?

El Censo 2020 preguntará el nombre, edad, género, raza/etnicidad, y relación a la cabeza del hogar de cada persona que vive en la casa, y si alquilan o son dueños de la casa. Grand jury records from 1946 lynching of two Black couples in Georgia cannot be released Publisher Note: Oh these poor children.

They were so young and innocent. Just imagine your baby girl being pulled from that car and the indignities she was made to go through before they blew her head off. Then on top of that there was no hint of justice from the country sworn to protect and defend you. The crimes committed on our people then and now are too much to bear. We must rise up against all of them, for all of them, and say, "NO MORE". REPARATIONS NOW! the FBI descended upon the rural community in Walton County, about 50 miles east of Atlanta. Following a monthslong investigation, more than 100 people reportedly testified before a federal grand jury in December 1946, but no one was indicted.

Historian Anthony Pitch wrote about the killings - 'The Last Lynching: How a Gruesome Mass Murder Rocked a Small Georgia Town' - and continued his research after the book's 2016 circumstances.' Relying on that precedent, a federal judge in 2017 granted Pitch's petition and ordered the Moore's Ford grand jury records unsealed. The U.S. Department of Justice appealed, citing the secrecy of grand jury proceedings.

A three-judge panel of the 11th Circuit ruled 2-1 in February 2019 to uphold the lower court's order. But the full court voted to rehear the case, and oral arguments before all 12 judges were held in October.

The full court opinion released Friday reversed the lower court ruling that

The grand jury records from the 1946 lynching of two Black couples in Georgia cannot be released despite their great historical significance, a federal appeals court said.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta ruled 8-4 that federal judges don't have authority to disclose grand jury records for reasons other than those provided for in the rules governing grand jury secrecy.

Roger and Dorothy Malcom and George and Mae Murray Dorsey were riding in a car on a rural road in July 1946 when a white mob stopped it at Moore's Ford Bridge, overlooking the Apalachee River. The mob dragged the young Black sharecroppers to the river's edge and shot them to death. The slayings shocked the nation, and publication. He learned transcripts of the grand jury proceedings, once thought to have been destroyed, were stored by the National Archives.

Pitch, died in June at age 80, but his widow took on the fight, along with Laura Wexler, who wrote another book about the lynching and joined the case at the family's request.

Joe Bell, a lawyer for Pitch's widow, said he plans to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

'He's looking down from a better spot,' Bell said of Pitch. 'He's going to guide me through this.'

Rules governing grand jury secrecy provide specific exceptions that allow for the release of records. An 11th Circuit decision from 1984 had said judges may go beyond that and order their disclosure in 'exceptional had been affirmed by the panel and also overturned the court's 1984 ruling.

The majority opinion written by Senior Judge Gerald Tjoflat says the exceptions listed in the grand jury secrecy rules are exhaustive. Judges 'do not possess the inherent, supervisory power to order the release of grand jury records in instances not covered by the rule,' he wrote.

In a concurring opinion, Judge Adalberto Jordan agreed that those exceptions are exclusive and that judges cannot go beyond them, but he said it's time to review the rules.

The Judicial Conference's Advisory Committee on Criminal Rules in 2012 decided not to go forward with a proposal from then-U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder to amend the rules 'to allow disclosure for historically significant grand jury materials,' Jordan wrote. The committee found the amendment unnecessary at the time but said the issue might be ripe for consideration later.

With a split between judicial circuits and a recent decision by the U.S. Supreme Court not to take up the issue, 'it appears that day is upon us,' Jordan wrote.

Judge Charles Wilson wrote in a dissenting opinion that the court should leave in place its 1984 opinion and uphold the release of the Moore's Ford documents. A judge's power to disclose grand jury materials outside

> of the provided exceptions is limited and the burden on the petitioner is high, but this case meets that bar, he wrote. The Civil Rights Cold Case Records Collection Act passed by Congress and signed in January 2019 by the president - provides for the review and release of government records related to unsolved civil rights cold cases.

> That makes it clear that Congress, which adopted the grand jury secrecy rules, intended for judges to have the authority to disclose grand jury records outside of the stated exceptions, Judge Robin Rosenbaum wrote in a separate dissent.

> The lynching happened in 1946 after Roger Malcom, 24, had been jailed after stabbing and gravely injuring a white man, Barnett Hester, during an argument. A white farmer, Loy Harrison, paid \$600 to bail Malcom out on

July 25, 1946. Harrison later said he was ambushed by a mob as he drove the Malcoms and Dorseys home.

Harrison, identified in an FBI report as a former Ku Klux Klansman and well-known bootlegger, wasn't hurt. He told authorities he didn't recognize anyone in the mob.

The killings remain unsolved, despite law enforcement having reopened the case several times and efforts by students, researchers and activists to crack the case.

Before the October arguments, the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press and 30 news organizations, including The Associated Press, submitted a brief in support of Pitch that the court rejected without explanation.

"Bread for Words: A Frederick Douglass Story"



It's that time of day and your stomach's growling.

That's what happens when you're hungry and you need to eat: your body reminds you that a growing kid



like you needs good food. Feeding your belly makes you stronger, and in the new book "Bread for Words: A Frederick Douglass Story" by Shana Keller, illustrated by Kayla Stark, a young boy finds something to feed his soul.

Little Freddy didn't know when he was born, but he knew where: he came into the world in a cabin in Tuckahoe, Maryland, and he lived there with his Grandma.

He did for awhile, anyhow, until the day Grandma sadly told Freddy that he had to leave the cabin because he was a slave and Old Master needed him at "the Great House Farm." Freddy didn't exactly know what a slave was, but he quickly learned that being one meant lots of work and he absolutely had no say-so about it.

The only reason for that, as far as he could tell, was that his skin was dark and Master's son, Daniel, was fairskinned. This also meant that Daniel had a nice bed with blankets, while Freddy had nothing like that at all. Daniel also had schoolbooks, but

when Freddy asked to learn to read and write, he was told that it was "Unlawful" and "Unsafe."

Maybe he shouldn't have asked: his questioning got him sent to Baltimore, where he was supposed to take care of a boy named Thomas. Once there, Freddy got a better bed and just a little education, thanks to Thomas's mother - but then Thomas's father became very angry when he learned

> that his wife taught Freddy some words! Thomas's father knew that if Freddy could read, he might try to reach for freedom.

It was *right then* that Freddy knew how reading "could loosen the chains of bondage." It was then that he knew he had to make a plan. "That moment" made him figure out a way...

No doubt about it: your child loves books. Most kids do; they love the pictures, the words, and the goodness of snuggling up with a new story. "Bread for Words" is one they'll love to share.

You'll have plenty to discuss with your little book-fan, too, once you've read this tale together. Author Shana Keller uses a small-but-momentous chain of events to introduce children to the life and work of Frederick Douglass, and it's all told quite minimally, staring with small slices of plantation life and ending with Douglass' search for learning. This brevity makes the story more powerful in its lack. Hint: don't bother with the afterword; it mostly just repeats the body of the book, but do read the author's notes. Properly introduced and explained in a kid-friendly way, they could send kids running for more information.

While illustrations by Kayla Stark could be fun for small children, this book is really more for early grade-schoolers who enjoy biographies and history. Introduce "Bread for Words"to your 6-to-10-year-old, and they'll be eager to bite into it.

Census 2020 - Trenton Counts

It is that time again. Every ten years, since 1790, America has counted her people. In the first census, the population of the United States was 3,929,214.

Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson and President George Washington thought the first census was undercounted and that has been the reality ever since then. The numbers are important because they are supposed used to determine what areas get what money. The more people in an area means the more money will be distributed to that area. But I think we can pretty much tell by the conditions in high population areas as opposed to those in more spread out areas, that isn't always true.

Census 2020 has started. The official US Census Day was April 1. This year everyone should have received through the mail a census form. This form can be filled out and mailed in

or there is an address to go on the Internet to file online. This is the first time the Internet is being used as a major player in counting the people of America.

Letters of invitation went out in the middle of March and every household should have received one. These letters invite everyone to go online a fill out the Census Questionaire. You can find this at: https://my2020census.gov/

When you go to the site, a very simple form, which will guide you step by step to filling out the form. It will take you under 15 minutes to do the entire questionnaire, so go there and do what you do.

Why? Why should you fill out the Census form? The Census is used for all kinds of things. Chief among these is it will tell us how many people live in the country. This population data will be broken down and analyzed. The numbers will be broken down to how many Black people, how many brown people, how many white people, how many Chinese people and on and on.

These numbers are not only informational, they are fun. I love sitting for and what they do.

Census data is used to divvy up about

a trillion dollars. The more people you have, the more money you get. So if Trenton's count is 93,000 instead of 84,500 we'll get money for 8500 extra people.

The US uses the Census to pay for massive programs, such as - Medicaid - \$365 B, Federal Direct Student Loans - \$93 B, Food Stamps - \$66 B, Medicare - Part B - \$66 B, Highway Planning and Construction - \$40 B, Federal Pell Grants - \$26 B, Section 8 Housing Vouchers - \$19 B and so on. This is money that is critically important to communities. Without these funds, poor people especially, would fine life harder than it already it.

Trenton is at a high risk of being undercounted. This is because of Trenton's relative poverty. The poorer a community is the less likely it residents are to fill out the Census forms. Also there are a lot of renters,

mobile residents are harder to track down. We also have a large community of people who don't speak English at home. And many have poor access to the internet.

Because of this Census 2020 plans to roll out other ways to get responses. When people

don't respond either by phone or online by early April they will receive a paper form in the mail. If there do not respond by late May, the Census 2020 will send census takers out to knock on their doors. This mean hundreds of workers will visit high non-response neighbors through out the city.

This can be scary to many people. Government workers showing up at Black and Brown peoples' doors is not welcomed. Historically the Census has sent young, white people into these Black communities. They are not trusted and many will not let them into their homes. Even those who do are often put off by the intrusion and will not honestly give up truthful information.

It is why the response rate in these neighborhoods is so poor. Hopefully, though doubtfully, the Census has learned from these past mistakes and will hire more people of color and members of these neighborhoods. These more friendly faces may gain more access and increase the count.

So far the Census has not been transparent in its hiring information, so only the actual canvass will show hours checking out who live where if there are more local community workers.

the spread of the coronavirus, several governments are using technology to monitor quarantines, particularly of people coming in from overseas. unknown, eliminated that unit.

However, perhaps the most damning indictment of the current regime's incompetent response to the coronavirus is the regime's own actions prior to the outbreak of the virus.

From January 2019 to August of that year, the US Department of Health and Human Services conducted a scenario named "Crimson Contagion" to see how the federal government would respond to a fictional viral attack. The scenario included participation from 19 federal agencies, a dozen states, tribal nations, hospitals and nongovernmental organizations. The fictional outbreak involved a group of tourists visiting China who then become infected and fly home to various countries, including the US. In this scenario, the virus is first detected in Chicago.

The US Department of Health and Human Services concluded that the US did not have the capacity to manufacture personal protective equipment, needles and syringes. The report noted that these supplies, along with antiviral medications, respirators and ventilators, would be "limited and difficult to restock," due to them being largely manufactured overseas.

As part of an effort to assist Trenton businesses experiencing hardships as a result of the coronavirus and public health efforts to control it, Trenton Mayor Reed Gusciora has created the Small Business Fiscal Relief Program. The new initiative which would allow the city to provide loans to Trenton-based businesses during the coronavirus pandemic has been sent to the City Council for its approval. Pending City Council approval, the city would begin fielding applications with the funds being disbursed shortly thereafter.

"Trenton is not an exception to the economic impacts of our current situation. We are fighting tooth and nail to get cash into the hands of local businesses to help keep them afloat during these difficult times and to keep folks on the payroll who might otherwise lose their jobs." asserted Mayor Gusciora. "I will not stand by and let generational storefronts close their doors."

The city is looking to allocate around \$2 million dollars for the program. Terms of the loans would include the following:

60-month (5-year) repayment term. No payments and 0% interest for the first year.

2% interest amortized over the

remaining term of the loan (48 months).

"We need to bridge the fiscal gap that our shops and restaurants are undoubtedly experiencing." maintained Mayor Gusciora. "I don't think there has ever been a need as urgent as this for the city to immediately bolster our local economy."

All supporting documentation and applications will be made available on the city website located at www. trentonnj.org.

All businesses must be in good standing, be located within the city limits, and be able to submit all local, state and federal tax documents as detailed in the application.

"Our businesses need the city now more than ever. They cannot wait for the county. They cannot wait for the state. They cannot wait for the federal government to let money trickle down into their cash registers." stated Mayor Gusciora.

"They need this money now, and we're not stopping until we make that happen. These funds are vital to the survival of our city's businesses and the residents who own, operate, and staff them."

What's Happening

We as black people are already in last place in this rat race we call "life" in America. Most of it is due to the lack of information provided to us and the gaps in wealth between privileged and marginalized communities throughout the history of this country. Let's not forget the devastating



impact of slavery where that form of sentencing set a precedence in this nation which was abolished on January 31, 1865 and later ratified on December 6, 1865. The white households' wealth has exceeded Black households for a number of generations. The U.S. government has a longstanding history of facilitating wealth for white Americans.

In the Land Act of 1785, Congress transferred wealth to citizens on terms that were quite favorable. In some instances, land could be attained by the luck of the draw, but only if you were a white man. At that time, black people were considered to be "valuable assets" and were used as tools to create wealth. In the south, entrepreneurs and slave owners took loans out against the collateral value of their property in the form of people to fund new businesses. In the 1866 Homestead Act it included blacks specifically in the transfer of public lands to private farmers, but discrimination and poor implementation doomed the policy. Black politicians

during the Reconstruction Era attempted to use tax policy to force land on the market, but this was met with violent resistance. While Blacks made gains in wealth acquisition after chattel slavery ended, the pace was slow and started from a base of essentially nothing. Whites could use violence to force blacks from their

property via the terrorism of whitecapping, where blacks were literally ran out of town and their possessions stolen. This includes the race riots.

By 1915, Black property owners in the south had less than one-tenth of the wealth of white landowners. This trend remained stable for the next 50 years. In 1965, 100 years after Emancipation, Blacks were more than 10% of the population, but held less than 2% of the wealth in the U.S., and less than 0.1% of the wealth in stocks. Wealth had remained fundamentally unchanged and structurally out of reach of the vast majority of Blacks. These racially exclusionary systems endured well into the 20th

century.

In the 20th century, Blacks were largely excluded from the New Deal and World War II public policies, which were responsible for the asset creation of the American middle class. It is important to note that it was never the case that a white assetbased middle class simply emerged. Rather than education leading to wealth, it is wealth that facilitates the acquisition of an expensive education. The essential value of wealth is its functional role; the financial security to take risks and the financial agency that wealth affords is transformative.

In our view, education alone cannot address the centuries-long exclusion of Blacks from the benefits of wealth-generating policies and the extraction of whatever wealth they may have. The most just approach would be a comprehensive reparation program that acknowledges these grievances and offers compensatory restitution, including ownership of land and other means of production.
